The early eighteenth century houses in Scotch Street and adjoining lanes to Lowther Street are threatened with demolition. Before they disappear, Mrs. Helen Hallaway will give a talk on eighteenth century Carlisle in general and, in particular, the Jackson family who lived in what is now known as Stansfield's Building for over one hundred years.

Margery Jackson, whose name locally is a byword for sordid penury, was the only daughter of Alderman Joseph Jackson officially a cloth-merchant and, unofficially, a money-lender in the town. The period of her lifetime, 1722 to 1812, was one of gentle and gradual alteration for Carlisle from a tiny, garrison town with few inhabitants and fewer prospects, to a thriving commercial city expanding far beyond it's walls.

Evidence of the culture which influenced the prosperity of the city is provided by these few remaining town houses and, in this age of violent and sudden change, their preservation is important to the history of Carlisle.
